Traffic Fatalities/ Severe Injuries

- Each year, more than 40,000 people are needlessly killed on American streets
- Society has considered traffic deaths and severe injuries to be inevitable side effects of modern life
- Loss of life creates a tragic toll, extending beyond personal loss

What is Vision Zero?

Vision Zero is a strategy to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy, equitable mobility for all.

It's gaining momentum in major American and key cities/municipalities in Florida.



A New Vision for Safety

TRADITIONAL APPROACH

- Traffic deaths are **INEVITABLE**
- **PERFECT** human behavior
- Prevent **COLLISIONS**
- **INDIVIDUAL** responsibility
- Saving lives is **EXPENSIVE**

VISION ZERO

- Traffic deaths are **PREVENTABLE**
- Integrate **HUMAN FAILURE**
- Prevent **FATAL & SEVERE CRASHES**
- **SYSTEMS** approach
- Saving lives is **NOT EXPENSIVE**

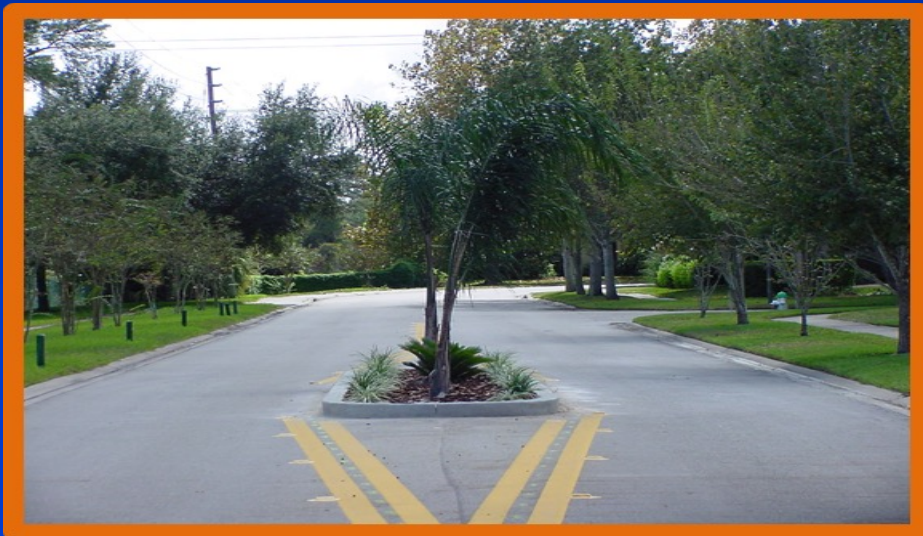

Education

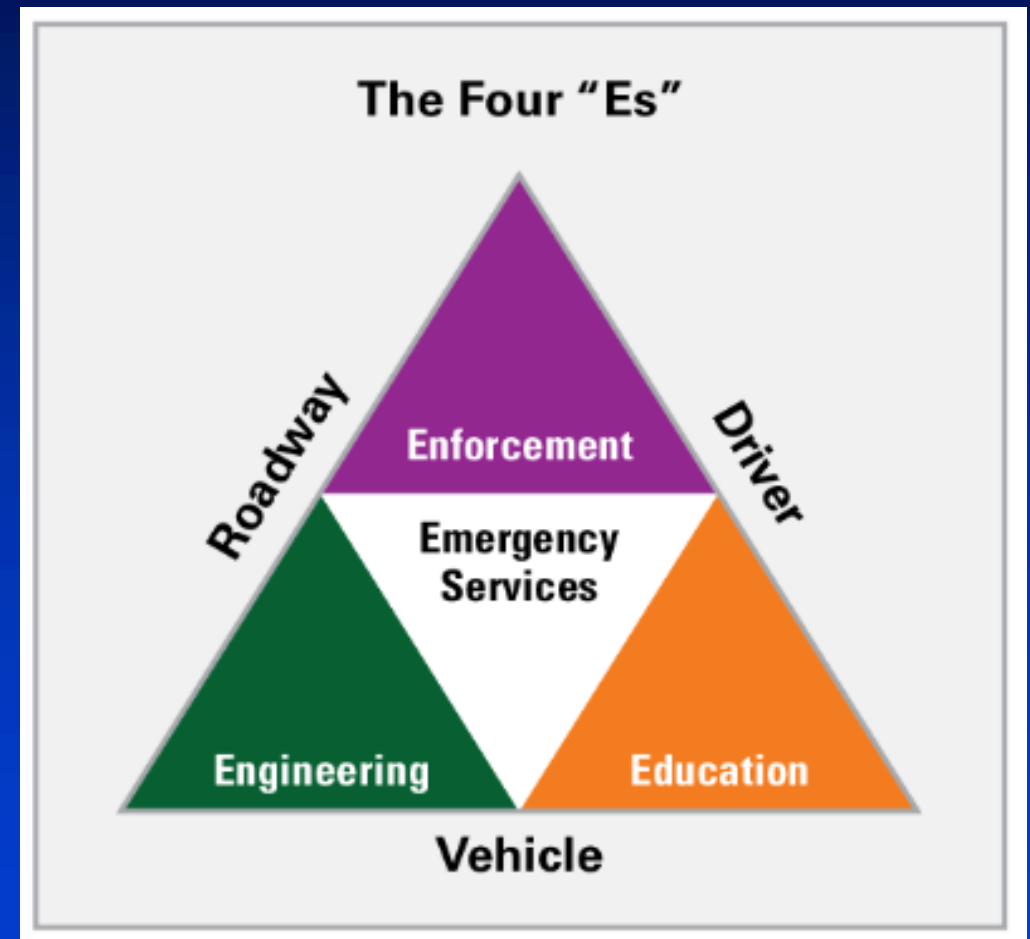
- Awareness, teaching, training

How does OCSO respond to Traffic Complaints?

- Traffic complaints are received through the Commissioner's Office, Online Reporting, Calls for Service and Deputy Observations
- Traffic complaints are disseminated to Uniform Patrol and the OCSO Traffic/Motors Unit
- OCSO responds to the complaints as they are received and handle formally with law enforcement action or informally through education
- Between October 2021 – October 2022, 197 traffic citations were issued along Clarcona Ocoee Road
