Debris Removal Contractor Will Start Thursday, Oct. 6, 2022

- Crews will start collecting large storm debris Oct. 6, 2022.
- They will make multiple passes to collect storm debris focusing on vegetative debris first.
- After vegetative debris is picked up, crews will collect wood products such as pieces of a fence, and other debris like drywall, plaster, steel, brick, clay tile, asphalt shingles, and concrete.
- Place debris on the curb at the edge of your property.
- Separate items to be collected Put

vegetative debris consisting of large branches, tree limbs, logs, and plants at the curb in a pile separate from any other kind of debris. i.e., steel, wood, concrete, etc.

 All your leaves and small debris will be handled as normal by Orange County Solid Waste. Make sure this debris is bagged or in cans, as required.

Neighborhood Communication

During the hurricane, some District 2 neighborhoods were able to keep in touch with residents due to an old-style "call chain", e-mail list, or via social media groups such as Facebook.

It's always important to keep in touch with fellow residents but can actually mean the difference between life and death during and after a storm like Hurricane Ian.

I'm encouraging all District 2 residents to create a communication plan for use within your neighborhood.

Remember, it doesn't have to be fancy, you just need to communicate important information.
